MA. JOY V. ABRENICA is a Professor at the School of Economics, University of the Philippines Diliman and Research Fellow at the Center for the Advancement of Trade Integration and Facilitation. Her research interests are in energy, telecommunications, competition policy and trade.

AGUSTIN L. ARCENAS is an Associate Professor and Director of the Public Affairs Office at the U.P. School of Economics. Mendoza obtained his Bachelor's Degree in Economics (Honors Program) from the Ateneo de Manila University in the Philippines, his Masters in Public Administration and International Development (MPA-ID) from the John F. Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University, and his MA and PhD in Economics from Fordham University. He is a recipient of various awards, including the 2012 National Academy of Science and Technology's Ten Outstanding Young Scientist (OYS) in the Philippines (in Economics), the World Economic Forum's Young Global Leaders in 2013, and Devex 40 Under 40 Development Leader in 2013. Mendoza is also a reserve officer with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel with the Philippine Air Force Reserve Command.
