## NOTES ON THE CONTRIBUTORS

**Ma Luisa T Camagay** is a professor at the Department of History, College of Social Sciences and Philosophy, University of the Philippines in Diliman. She obtained her *doctorat de troisieme cycle* at the Ecole des Hautes Etudes en Sciences Sociales in Paris, France. Her books *Kasaysayan Panlipunan ng Maynila (1765-1898)* and *Working Women of Manila in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century* won the 1993 and 1995 National Book Award in History, respectively.

John J Carroll, \$J was born in the United States of America. He first arrived in the Philippines in 1946 as a young Jesuit in the early stages of his training. He has been in the country most of the time since then, as teacher, researcher and writer, and week-end pastor to urban poor communities. Fr Carroll holds a PhD in sociology and Southeast Asian studies from Cornell University. Currently he is Associate Director of the Institute on Church and Social Issues based at the Ateneo de Manila University. He is the principal author of three books, as well as many articles and book chapters, mainly on Philippine topics, and is a regular contributor to the 'Commentary' section of the *Philippine Daily Inquirer*.

Carolina 6 Hernandez is a Professor of Political Science at the University of the Philippines in Diliman and president of the Institute for Strategic and Development Studies, Inc. which, in coordination with the Department of Foreign Affairs and the National Security Council, has formulated important foreign and security policy. Her articles and monographs on the military in politics, regional security, Philippine politics, foreign relations and democratization have been published widely. She is affiliated with a number of prestigious international academic institutions and think tanks and is an active participant in the region's non-formal track of studies and discussions that help shape official policy. She served in the Fact-Finding (Davide) Commission that investigated the failed coup of 1989.

Francisco A Lava Jr graduated from the UP Elementary School in 1941, the UP High School in 1946, and the Manuel L. Quezon School of Law in 1952. He is a member of the UP Sigma Rho fraternity (batch 1948). He was a member of the CPP from 1950 to 1970, and was its general secretary from 1967 to 1970.

Jesus B Lava is a well known nationalist and communist leader in the Philippines. He graduated from Araullo High School (formerly Manila South High School) in 1931, and from the University of the Philippines College of Medicine in 1938. He

is a member of the Phi Kappa Mu fraternity. He was with the Communist Party of the Philippines (CPP) from 1942 to 1964 and from 1975 up to 1989 when he refused to renew his membership. He served as CPP general secretary from 1950 to 1964. He was given a special Gawad ng Kagitingan by the UP Medical Alumni Society in 1998.

**Doracie Z Nantes** is an associate professor at the Department of Geography of the University of the Philippines in Diliman. She finished her doctorate at Rutgers University in New Jersey. She has published articles on flood control, urban planning, land conversion and related topics.

Carolyn I Sobritchea is a Professor of Philippine Studies at the University of the Philippines in Diliman and director of the UP Center for Women's Studies. She has conducted numerous research and consultancy work primarily on women's studies, Philippine peasantry and agrarian issues. She is also actively involved in gender training and planning. Her articles and monographs have been published widely. She is affiliated with a number of women's groups and is the president of Women's Institute for Sustainable Economic Action (WISE ACT) Inc.

**Daiva Stasiulis** is a Professor of Sociology at Carleton University, Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. She is co-editor of *Unsettling Settler Societies: Articulations of Gender, Race, Ethnicity and Class.* She has also written numerous articles on migrant women, race, gender and public policy in Canada.

Abigail B Bakan is a Professor of Political Studies and Women's Studies at Queen's University, Kingston, Ontario, Canada. She is the author of *Ideology and Class Conflict in Jamaica: The Politics of Rebellion* and co-editor of *Imperial Power and Regional Trade: The Caribbean Basin Initiative.* She has also written numerous articles on migrant women, international political economy and development studies.
