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# INTRODUCTION

Founded in 1985 by the late University of the Philippines (UP) President Edgardo J. Angara, the UP Center for Integrative and Development Studies (UP CIDS) is the University's policy research unit that aims to address problems of national significance by employing an integrative and collaborative approach in the conduct of studies on various aspects of public policy and harnessing the University's multidisciplinary expertise and expansive resources.

Based on then-UP President Angara's Executive Order No. 9 issued on 24 September 1985, UP CIDS has the following objectives and functions:

- Develop, organize, and manage research issues of national significance, for such issues, because of their importance and inherent complexity, require an integrative and collaborative approach and also more sophisticated research methodologies and skills;
- Encourage and support research and study on these issues by various units of the university and individual scholars;
- Secure funding from public and private persons and agencies; and
- Ensure that the research outputs and recommendations of the center are published and openly disseminated.

UP CIDS is likewise guided by UP's Strategic Plan 2017–2023 and contributes to the University's thrust of (a) contributing to national development through knowledge creation and public service, and (b) promoting access and diversity through enhancing structures and policies for collaboration and undertaking internationalization efforts.

## RESEARCH PROGRAMS

UP CIDS adopts a programmatic structure wherein a sizable network of scholars are brought together and organized under Research Programs through which a shared research agenda is pursued and networks within and outside the University are built upon.

Consistent with its integrative and collaborative approach, UP CIDS also provides opportunities and venues for the various Research Programs to work on common themes and emerging international and national policy concerns.

The Center currently supports 12 Research Programs grouped into three general clusters. The Research Programs of UP CIDS are as follows:

## CORE STAFF

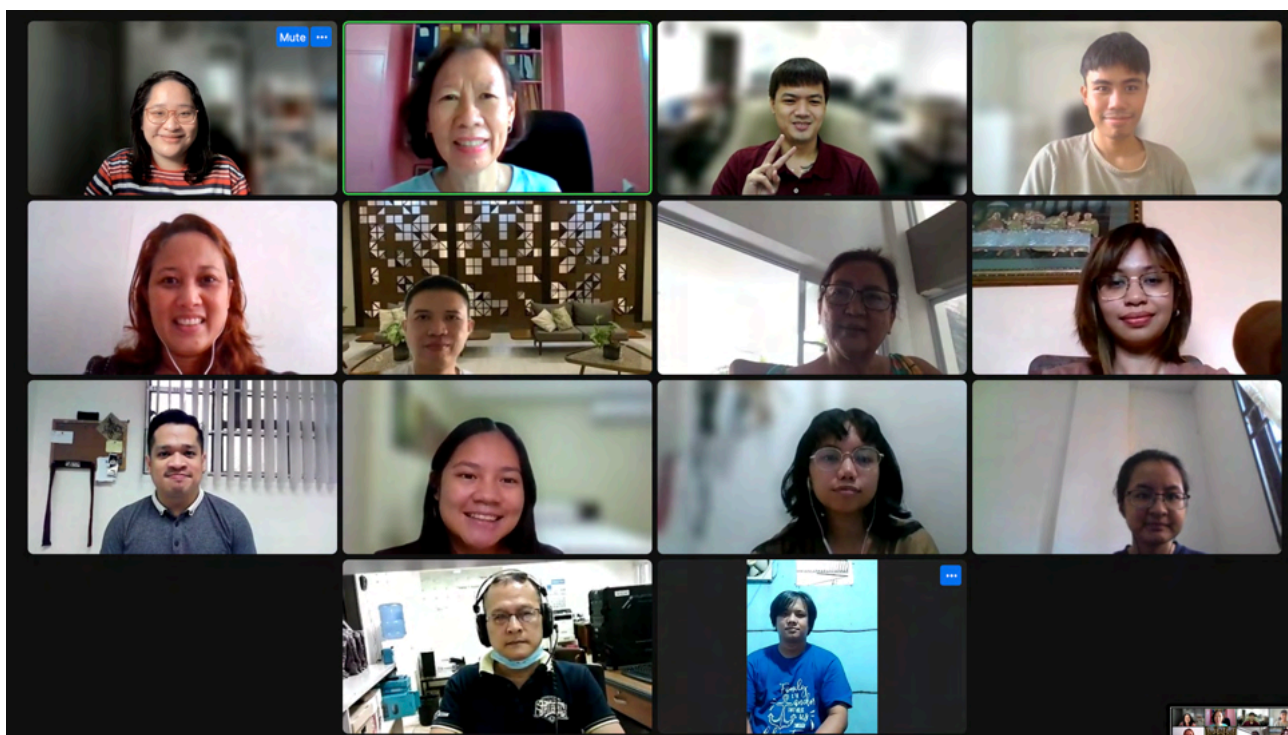

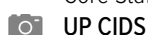
## LIBRARY AND RESOURCES

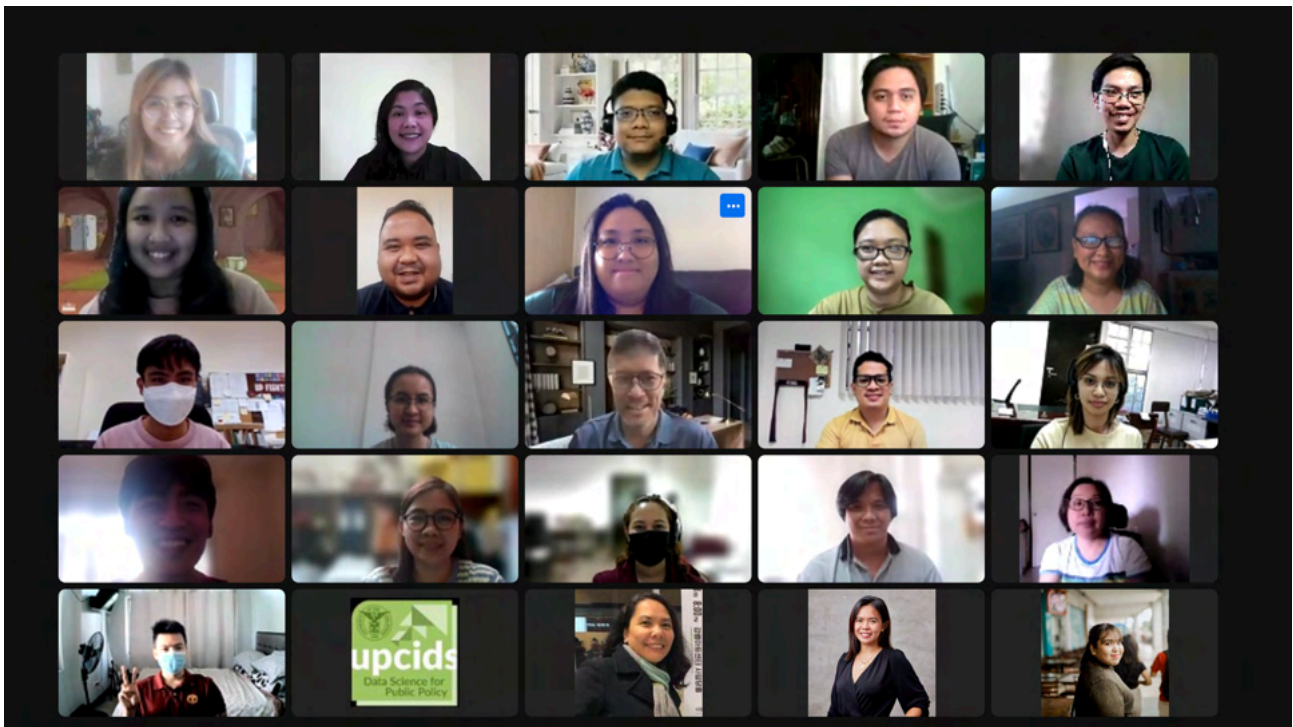
Because of constraints due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the UP CIDS Library employed a hybrid set-up: it continued its physical operations to limited clients while maintaining its online services. Meanwhile, its digitization project in collaboration with the UP Diliman Main Library is now fully completed. In this project, around 740 UP CIDS research reports/outputs of the Center have been digitized, in addition to about 100 other titles that were born digital. The next step for this project is to upload these publications gradually to the UP CIDS website.

The UP CIDS Library is also collaborating with other databases to which the Center is connected to digitize its book collection. At present, this said book collection is under preparation for mass digitization.

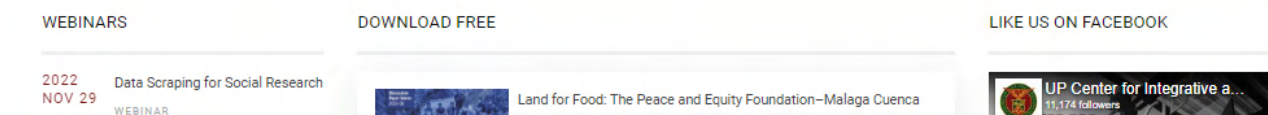




Year-End Convenor's Meeting

## OFFICE AND RECORDS DIGITIZATION

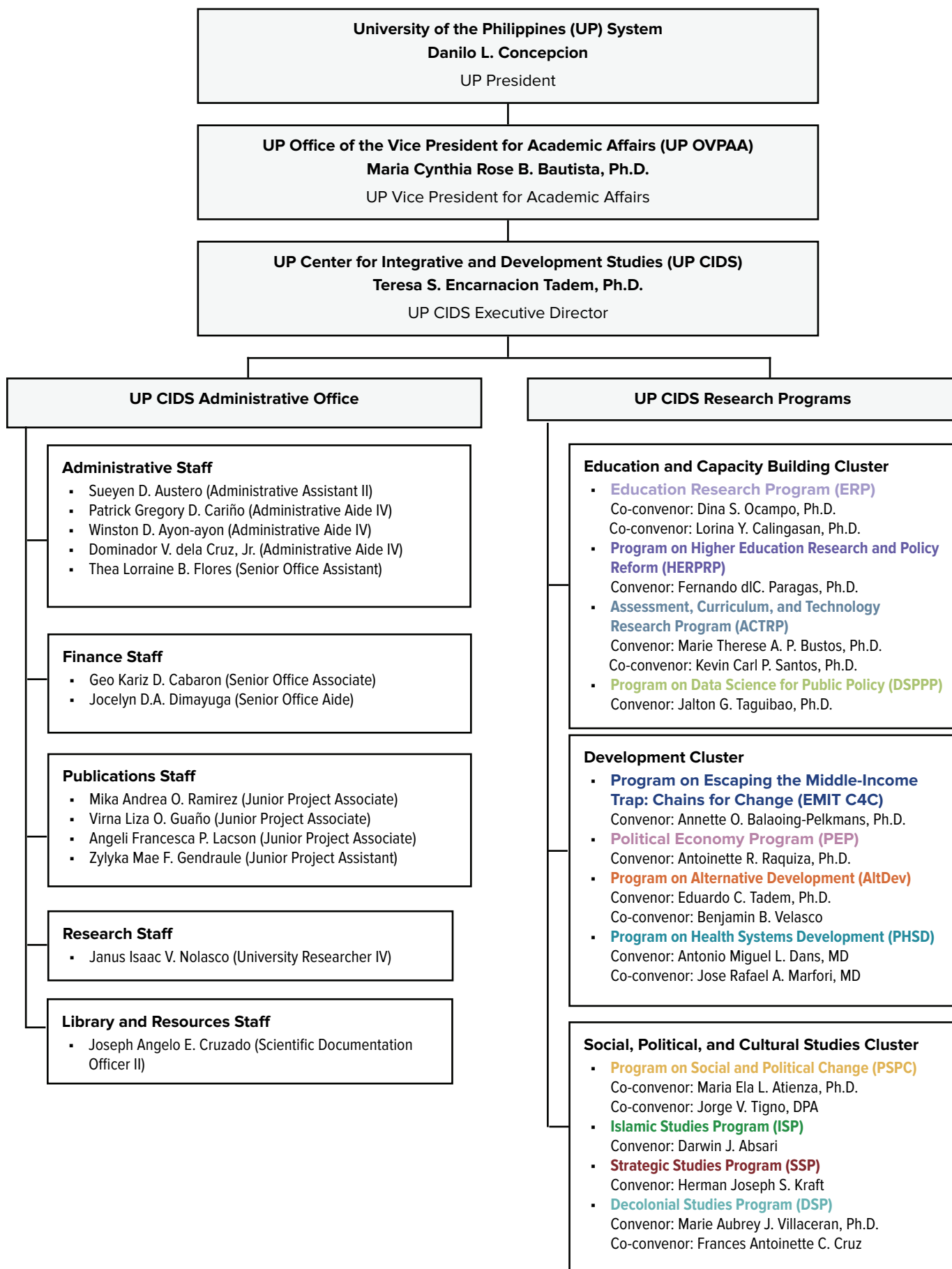
UP CIDS continued managing its administrative, financial, and legal documents by digitizing and archiving all of its office records. As of the end of 2022, a total of 1,280 semiactive and inactive records have been fully scanned and archived. The Center is currently conducting quality checking and inventory listing of the scanned records.

## WEBSITE

In July 2022 to December 2022, the UP CIDS Publications Unit was able to initiate gradual yet significant changes to the layout of key pages in the Center's website. The first major revision pertained to the home page, which had extraneous elements that were eventually dropped to declutter the page and create a "cleaner" look. The downloads section and the events tab were also tweaked a bit to help establish a more minimalist look.

The second major update concerns the layout of each Program page. Once again, the aim was to create a cleaner look, so the sidebar was removed and transferred to the bottom. The list of publications was updated as well and moved closer to the top to give it prominence, while the Program staff were relegated towards the bottom. Only a few programs have had their pages updated, and the updating will continue in 2023.

Other changes in the website involved the clearer differentiation in the Research Program items; creation of the webinar, revision of the News page, and creation of the podcast page. Several changes were done through the guidance of the web developer, which trained the UP CIDS staff in basic operations of the website management platform/theme in early October 2022. They also provided assistance when Center staff asked for help.

The **Education Research Program** (ERP) conducts research under three categories: (1) curriculum and assessment; (2) instruction and teacher development and governance; and (3) finance and school improvement. These three categories are based on ERP's agenda, "Policy Investigations in Support of the Filipino Learner 2019–2024." In its research, ERP conducts numerous investigations, which are guided by analysis drawn from statistics, education studies, and multiple stakeholder consultations. This 2022, ERP directed its focus to the areas of language and literacy, and disinformation studies.

## ACTIVITIES FROM JULY TO DECEMBER 2022

### WORKSHOP

#### **Spotting Fake News Online (Batches 7 and 8)**

6 and 20 July 2022

The “Spotting Fake News Online” workshop series was conducted as part of ERP’s disinformation research. This series aimed to provide research-based strategies on how to fight disinformation, as well as to gather information on digital literacy. Last 6 July 2022, the seventh batch of the workshop was held face-to-face, with 130 participants from St. Anthony’s College in Sta. Ana, Cagayan. Then, on 20 July 2022, the eighth batch was conducted online via Zoom, with 120 faculty and staff from La Salle College Antipolo. Both workshop batches were made in collaboration with De La Salle Philippines and One La Salle Foundation.

### BROWN BAG SESSION

#### **Conducting Remote Ethnography with Dr.**

**Eufracio Abaya**

13 July 2022

The brown bag session with Dr. Eufracio Abaya, cultural anthropologist and Professorial Lecturer from the Department of Art Studies, College of Arts and Letters, UP Diliman, was conducted in preparation for the ERP team’s planned fieldwork. To prepare the team for the meeting, journal articles were assigned by Prof. Abaya and a preliminary meeting was set with Prof. Romylyn Metila and Prof. Maita Salvador—both from the UP Diliman College of Education—to establish the team’s specific needs and present knowledge on ethnographic studies with children. The brown bag discussion spurred the team’s revision and modification of its tools and data collection plans.

### ONLINE TRAINING

#### **Capacity Building of Kindergarten Teachers in Developing Professional Learning Design Schools from Calamba City**

17–19 August 2022

ERP Research Associate Margaret Mary Rosary Carmel Fua served as a resource speaker on the following topics: “Strengthening Foundational Skills in Kindergarten” and “Assessing Learning in

Kindergarten.” The training seminar was attended by kindergarten teachers from Calamba City in preparation for face-to-face classes.

### TRAINING

#### **Training of Community Learning Hubs Literacy Teacher Volunteers**

20–22 August 2022

ERP contributed to the training of *Angat Pinas* Foundation’s community learning hubs teacher volunteers at Hive Hotel, Quezon City, in collaboration with faculty from the College of Education, UP Diliman. The training was attended by volunteer teachers from 11 community learning hub sites throughout the Philippines. Co-convenor Dr. Dina Ocampo served as one of the speakers during the plenary session.

### CONFERENCE

#### **1st International Conference of the Society for Strategic Education Studies**

24–25 August 2022

ERP Research Associate Kathrina Lorraine Lucasan and Dr. Christine Joy Ballada of De La Salle University presented the study “Online Assessment of Literacy Skills During the COVID-19 Pandemic” in the conference. The study discussed the protocols used to administer decoding, oral reading fluency, and reading comprehension assessments in Sinugbuanong Binisaya, Filipino, and English to Grade 3 students in Iligan City, Lanao del Norte via videoconferencing. The Filipino and English assessments used were adopted from the MLAF (Kindergarten to Grade 3), with permission from ERP.

### WORKSHOP

#### **Consultative Workshop for the Development of K-3 Teaching Learning Materials for the Bangsamoro**

29–31 August 2022

ERP Research Associate Margaret Mary Rosary Carmel Fua served as a resource person for Adarna House, Inc. in their partnership with Pathways and the Ministry of Basic, Higher and Technical Education (MBHTE) of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region of Muslim Mindanao (BARMM). The workshop aimed to inform the assessment of existing learning resources and management systems for Kindergarten to Grade 3 of the MBHTE. Thereafter, an assessment

report was written with recommendations for improvement.

## **MENTORSHIP**

### **Select *Angat Pinas* Community Learning Hubs**

September 2022 to present

ERP researchers served as volunteer mentors for the Iloilo, Lucena, and Lumba Bayabao community learning hubs. Initial *kumustahan* meetings were set after the training to discuss updates on learning hub progress on preparations for and implementation of literacy programs, as well as concerns on starter kit content and implementation. Succeeding meetings were held, either through a set schedule or only when requested, depending on the needs of each hub. Together with faculty members from the UP Diliman College of Education, ERP also helped develop a template to structure pre- and post- assessment results reporting.

## **WORKSHOP**

### **Development of a Database for Mother Tongue–Based Multilingual Education Research**

September 2022 to present

ERP worked with faculty members from the UP Diliman College of Education to develop and accomplish a template and build a database of Mother Tongue–Based Multilingual Education (MTB-MLE) research conducted by Filipino researchers. This was done to collect evidence on the benefits of the MTB-MLE policy and bolster the UP Diliman College of Education’s statement of support. ## **WORKSHOP**

### **Workshop on Developing of K-3 Learning Materials for BARMM**

24–26 October 2022

ERP Research Associate Margaret Mary Rosary Carmel Fua conducted a talk on characteristics of Kindergarten to Grade 3 children, as well as the benefits of literature to literacy and mathematics learning to inform the development of picture books, leveled readers, and listening stories for children in BARMM. The workshop, attended by teacher-writers

and facilitated by known authors and illustrators of children’s books, was a partnership between Adarna House, Inc., Pathways and the MBHTE of BARMM.

## **CONFERENCE**

### **Asia-Pacific Conference on Curriculum Studies and Instructional Designing 2022**

28–30 October 2022

Hiroshima University, Japan

ERP fellows presented a paper highlighting the significant role of oral language (OL) in the early years and its impact on other developmental domains. The research sought to determine the OL components evident in three early language and literacy reference documents and in the Kindergarten Curriculum Guide (KCG). Curriculum mapping found that more than half of the competencies were classified under two or more language components, providing evidence for the interrelatedness of these components. Almost half of the KCG competencies were under expressive language, whereas 21% were identified as receptive skills. The informative function of language was highly evident at 72.6%, whereas other functions were present at 12.33% and below. Gaps, strengths, and recommendations were presented during this conference.

## **ROUNDTABLE DISCUSSION**

### **Framework Development for the MLAF (Grades 4 to 12)**

4 November 2022

Following the *delphi* technique, key resource persons were invited to participate as speakers and participants in a roundtable discussion. The discussion aimed to answer two questions: Which literacies should Grades 4 to 12 learners develop? What kind of assessments should be administered and how should these literacies be assessed? This roundtable discussion kickstarted ERP’s efforts to develop a framework for MLAF (Grades 4 to 12).

### **World Bank Learning Event: Strategic Choices for Education Reform in Eastern and Southern Africa**

7–13 November 2022

The paper shared reform actions and points of transformation observed during the process of designing and implementing multilingual education in the Philippines. The session was on Managing Reform Design and Implementation: Issues Emerging in the Process of System Reform and Implementation. The panel for the event was composed of resource persons from the Philippines, Indonesia, Ecuador, and Zimbabwe.

## FORUM

### *Sipat Edukasyon 2022*

21 November 2022

ERP conducted its annual research dissemination forum, *Sipat Edukasyon*, last 21 November 2022 online through Zoom, and streamed it live through the UP CIDS' Facebook page. The forum's primary aim was to share ERP's education research outputs with various stakeholders. It included topics on language and literacy studies, multiliteracy

assessments, and disinformation. For 2022, ERP partnered with De La Salle Philippines and One La Salle Foundation to provide Continuing Professional Development (CPD) units accreditation for the event.

## DIGITAL CONFERENCE

### *Gurong Magiting: Kaagapay sa Pagbuo ng Isang Bansang Nagbabasa*

25 November 2022

ERP Co-convenor Dr. Dina Ocampo served as a keynote speaker during the digital conference sponsored by Ayala Foundation, Inc. with the theme, "*Gurong Magiting*." The conference was open to the public and was attended by around 900 viewers on various social media platforms. Her presentation anchored on the theme "Building a Framework for Learning and Literacy Recovery," covering these points: (1) phases and aims of recovery; (2) the World Bank's rapid framework for learning and recovery; (3) five actions for children's literacy; (4) learner home contexts and corresponding support; and (5) flexible learning options; and (6) enabling local solutions.

## UPCOMING ACTIVITIES AND OUTPUTS FOR JANUARY TO JUNE 2023

### Goals

ERP will continue its pursuit of research goals in the three areas of language and literacy, disinformation, and *UsapTayo* studies. These will lead to the conduct of *Sipat Edukasyon 2023* and other discussion fora and training workshops, where ERP's research activities and findings will be shared. Hopefully, scholarly papers and discussion papers will also be published within the year.

Another target for 2023 is to obtain ethics clearance from review boards for all of ERP projects' research protocols. These will ensure that the Program's publications will meet scholarly publishers' requirements for ethical practice among human research, particularly vulnerable groups, such as young learners, indigenous peoples (IPs), and disadvantaged families and communities.

### Project Activities

To attain these objectives, the ERP language and literacy studies strand will develop the research protocols for the field trial of multi-modal versions of MLAF for Kindergarten to Grade 3 Filipino Children. Data

collection will begin in both school and community-based contexts.

On the other hand, the disinformation studies strand will review and revise existing training workshop processes and resources in preparation for research ethics application. ERP researchers will also collaborate with other UP units to develop the resources and materials to improve teachers' digital literacy competencies.

The *UsapTayo* studies strand will conduct preparations for data collection, which includes a survey of methods and materials and the development of data gathering tools. Once ethics approval is obtained, key informant interviews will be conducted. ERP will also facilitate the creation of a language program through quality circles.

Meanwhile, the ERP Co-production team will be working with partners to produce an Oral Language Program for five-year-old children. This will be based on basic research on the opportunities and gaps available to children in the kindergarten classroom. Parents and teachers will participate in the development, implementation, validation, and finalization of the program.

Lastly, the Language Capture and Ethnography team will begin the validation and pilot of research tools in preparation for actual data collection with families in target communities.

### Risk Assessment

There may be challenges in terms of finding funding and logistical requirements for conducting field work and attaining the desired number of participants to the various research projects. Therefore, ERP intends to strengthen existing partnerships, harness existing collaborative arrangements, develop new linkages, and seek external support for activities.

## ACTIVITIES

### *UsapTayo*: Language Capture and Ethnography

Ethics review application to the Philippine Normal University Ethics Review Board will be prioritized in January 2023. While waiting for the issuance of clearance, the team will prepare for data gathering by identifying the locale and the participants. Once ethics clearance is secured, tools will be validated and piloted. Consent and assent of the participants will be sought. Data gathering and data analysis will be done before the team prepares and publishes a journal article based on the gathered data.

### **UsapTayo: Stakeholders' Co-Production of an Oral Language Program for Five-Year-Old Children**

Through a comprehensive desk review, a survey of methods and materials, and the conduct of key informant interviews, the Co-production Team intends to identify the opportunities and gaps in the development of five-year-old children's oral language skills in the classroom. Guided by results drawn from contextual analysis, co-production of the oral language program will take place through the conduct of quality circles. Relevant stakeholders will take part in an iterative co-construction process that will inform instructional design and materials development. These instructional components will then undergo review and validation. A journal article will be drawn to document these activities.

### **MLAF**

Data collection for the research on literacy development of Kindergarten to Grade 3 (K-3) Filipino children using the multi-modal versions of MLAF K-3 in both school and community-based contexts will begin. Prior activities include finalization of research design and exploration of possible partnerships with private entities and non-government organizations (NGOs) for funding and expansion of sampling. Data analysis will be done at each time point. In addition, development of an assessment framework for Grades 4 to 12 will continue through follow-up activities, leading towards the construction of the assessment tools. ERP also plans to share the test development process of the MLAF in a conference.

### **Disinformation Studies in Education**

Application for research ethics and articulation of data findings will be prioritized for disinformation studies, particularly because the research study involves participants' personal online accounts. Furthermore, as disinformation is a multifaceted "phenomenon," it is necessary to collaborate with other UP units (e.g., UP Diliman College of Mass Communication [CMC], colleges offering Philippine Studies, and UP Integrated School [UPIS]) and organizations to deepen the analysis and further develop the resources to improve digital literacy competencies of teachers.

## ACTIVITIES FROM JULY TO DECEMBER 2022

### PAPER PRESENTATIONS

#### HERPRP Research Consultants Showcase

31 August 2022

Led by UP Diliman College of Education Asst. Prof. Jon Paul Maligalig, Ph.D. as moderator, HERPRP's Year 1 Research Consultants presented their policy papers last August 31, 2022. ### ROUNDTABLE DISCUSSION

#### Honor, Excellence, Equity, and Diversity (HEED): Innovative Futures in Teaching and Learning in UP

18 October 2022

As part of the activities of the Task Force on the Future of Teaching and Learning in UP, which is under the UP OVPAA, a virtual roundtable discussion was conducted last October 18, 2022. Twenty-four (24) representatives from various disciplines and constituent UP campuses were selected to help explore the concepts of honor, excellence, equity, and diversity in relation to teaching and learning in the University in the digital age. The UP Vice President for Academic Affairs, Dr. Cynthia Bautista, joined the conversation, together with members of the task force led by Dr. Patricia Arinto and Dr. Dina Ocampo—who is also the convenor of the UP CIDS Education Research Program (ERP)—as facilitators.

### UNCONFERENCE

#### The Future of Teaching and Learning in UP: An UnConference

18 November 2022

Prior to the second activity of the Task Force on the Future of Teaching and Learning in UP, a call for entries was released to gather reflections from UP faculty members on these two questions: (1) "What do you think is the future of teaching and learning in UP?"; and (2) "How can we foster honor, excellence, equity, and diversity in teaching and learning within and beyond an increasingly digital environment?"

These responses were later thoroughly presented and discussed in the unconference last November 18, 2022, with over 150 attendees from various constituent campuses.

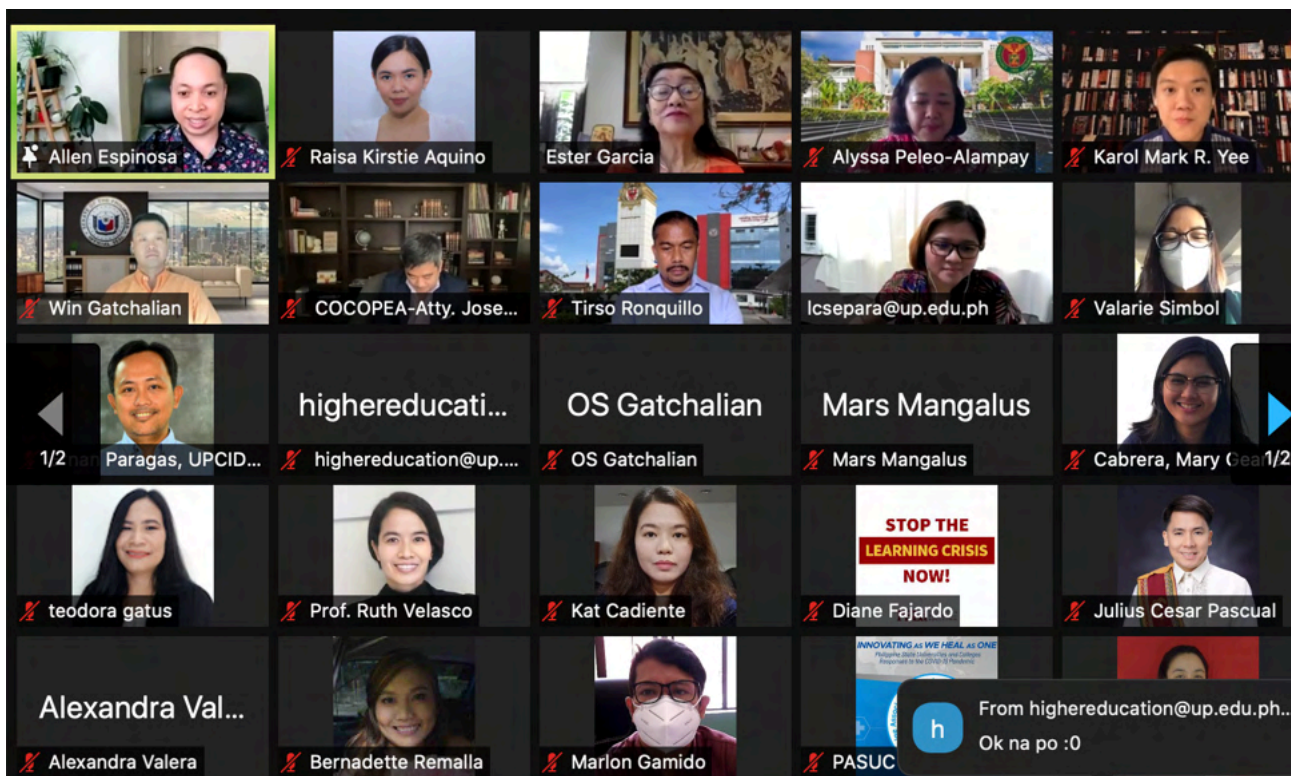

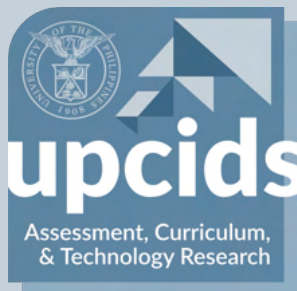

# ASSESSMENT, CURRICULUM, AND TECHNOLOGY RESEARCH PROGRAM

In 2012, the **Assessment, Curriculum, and Technology Research Program (ACTRP)** was established as a joint research center between the Assessment Research Centre (ARC) at the University of Melbourne and the University of the Philippines. Its role was to monitor the national curriculum and forecast likely influences of shifts in external pressures and issues that may impact curriculum. ACTRP also sought to reform assessment practices to incorporate more emphasis on formative assessment and a range of consequential actions that needed to be undertaken. In the past 10 years, ACTRP has provided evidence-based advice to the Department of Education (DepEd) and other education stakeholders.

## ACTIVITIES FROM JULY TO DECEMBER 2022

### TRAINING

#### Professional Development on Assessment for Teachers of Sustaining Education Reform Gains (SERG) Schools

21 June–29 July 2022

ACTRP, in partnership with Save the Children's Sustaining Education Reform Gains (SERG) project, delivered an assessment professional development program to teachers in SERG-supported schools in Regions V, VI, VIII, and X. Six topics were covered: (1) Assessment and its Purposes, (2) Assessment Planning, (3) Evidence Collection, (4) Interpretation and Use of Student Data during Classroom Discussion, (5) Interpretation and Use of Student Data between Lessons, and (6) Evaluation of Assessment Process. Each week, a topic was discussed asynchronously and summarized synchronously with a question-and-answer portion.

A total of 651 teachers participated in the Assessment Professional Development (APD) Program, and about 23.3% or 152 participants successfully completed the training. A multiple-response item

about the challenges and difficulties encountered in completing the sessions was asked, and most of the concerns of the 136 completers were on conflict with other school-related tasks ( $n = 160$ ; 85.3%), slow internet connection ( $n = 94$ ; 69.1%), and workload ( $n = 70$ ; 51.5%).

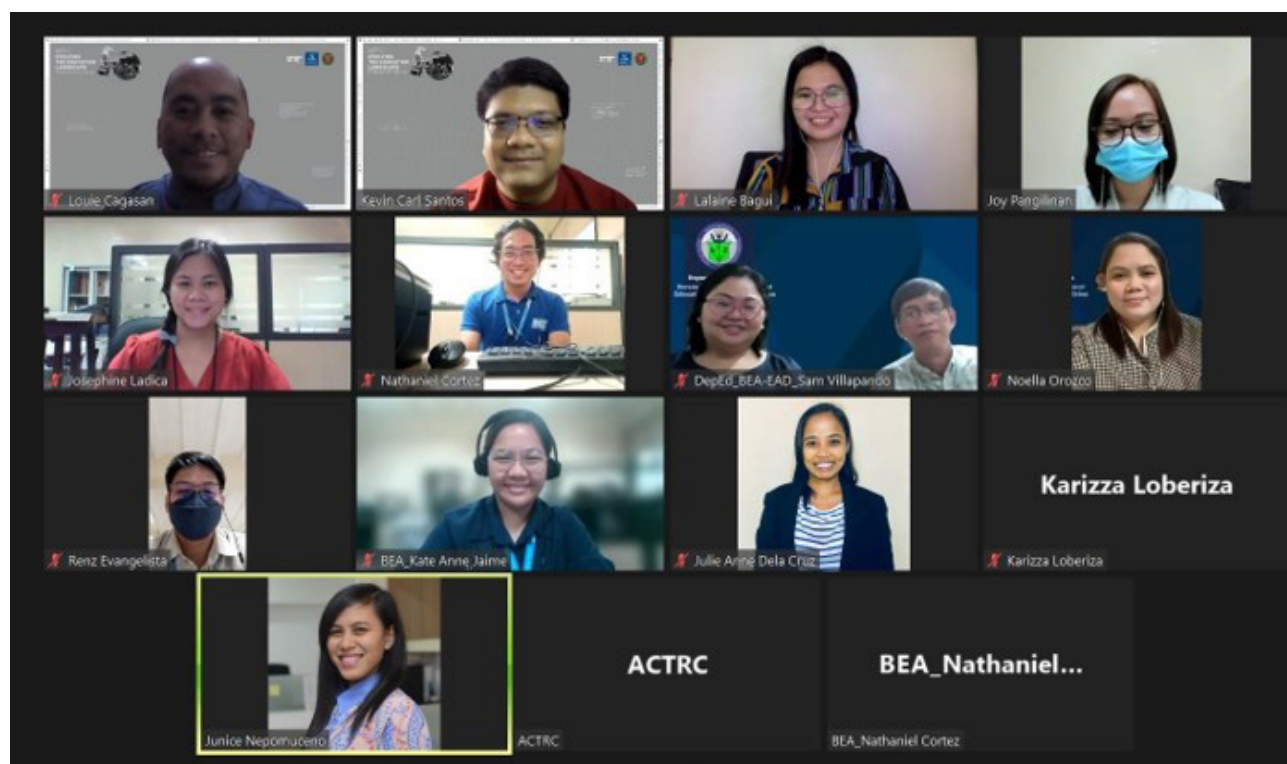
A comparison of pre- and post-test scores showed that there was a statistically significant improvement in participants' test scores at the end of the training ( $t [134] = 5.827$ ,  $p < 0.01$ ), with a medium effect size of 0.501 (Cohen's D). Most of the completers gave a positive evaluation of the training by strongly agreeing that the training was worth their time and effort ( $n = 127$ ; % = 83.6); they would recommend the training to others ( $n = 126$ ; % = 82.9); and overall, they were satisfied with the training ( $n = 123$ ; % = 80.9).

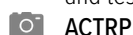

## **ORIENTATION/TRAINING**

### **ExamView Orientation and Training with DepEd–BEA Education Assessment Division (EAD) Specialists**

11 July 2022

ACTRP has been providing technical assistance to DepEd–BEA. With the objective to help BEA in organizing and analyzing existing and future assessment items, ACTRP recommended the use of an item banking software. During the orientation/training, features of the ExamView Assessment Suite were introduced to BEA–Education Assessment Division (EAD) specialists. Participants were divided into breakout rooms, where they had the opportunity to explore and practice creating item

banks and building a test using the software. Eight EAD specialists attended the orientation/training, led by their Chief Education Program Specialist, Danilyn Joy Pangilinan.

## **CONSULTATION WORKSHOP**

### **Stakeholders’ Convergence for Transforming Education Summit 2022**

5 August 2022

DepEd convened education stakeholders and partners as a culminating activity of the consultation series conducted in different parts of the country to identify challenges and priorities to be addressed to attain the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), in relation to providing quality education to Filipino learners. Findings from earlier consultations were presented as thematic action tracks. The event’s attendees were assigned to different thematic tracks to review the consultation findings and propose priority actions based on the results. Another objective of the activity was to gather commitment from education partners.

## MEETING

### Planning Meeting with MBHTE Representatives on the In-Service Training for BARMM Teachers

22 September 2022

As a partner of the Ministry of Basic, Higher, and Technical Education (MBHTE) of BARMM, UP has expressed its willingness to help MBHTE upskill BARMM teachers. Curriculum and Instruction Division Chief Yul Adelfo Olaya presented the rationale, topics, and other specifics of the Training of Trainers (TOT) and In-Service Training (INSET) of teachers. The Ugnayan ng Pahinungod System Director, faculty members from the College of Education, College of Arts and Letters, UP Integrated School (UPIS), National Institute of Science and Mathematics Education Development (NISMED) Director Sheryl Lyn C. Monterola, Ph.D. and Research Extension and Professional Staff (REPS), and ACTRP Research Officers attended the planning meeting.

## CONSULTATION WORKSHOP

### Consultation Workshop with CHED Technical Panel on the Revised K-to-10 Curriculum

3–5 October 2022

The DepEd–Bureau of Curriculum Development (DepEd–BCD) gathered the members of CHED’s Technical Panel on Teacher Education, representatives of different universities, and members of the Teacher Education Council (TEC) for consultation regarding the revised K to 10 curriculum. Participants were grouped according

to their learning area expertise and were asked to review and validate the draft of the refined K to 10 curriculum guides. ACTRP attended the workshop as DepEd’s partner in the conduct of the curriculum review and revision of curriculum guides.

The 15th NCS was spearheaded by the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) and part of the 33rd National Statistics Month celebration.

ACTRP, together with the UP College of Education Educational Research and Evaluation Area and Psychometrics Research Laboratory, organized the Colloquium Series on Cognitive Diagnosis Modeling and Applications. Three experts in the field of psychometrics were invited to give their presentations: Dr. Jimmy de la Torre (The University of Hong Kong) with a talk on "Cognitively Diagnostic Assessment and Cognitive Diagnosis Modeling: A Complete Example and Some Recent Developments"; Dr. Miguel Sorrel (Universidad Autonoma de Madrid), with his presentation entitled "A Critical Review of Available Empirical Applications in Cognitive Diagnosis Modeling"; and Dr. Wenchao Ma (University of Alabama) on "Cognitive Diagnostic Analysis using R Shiny App."

## TRAINING

### In-Service Training for Key Stage 3 (Junior High School) and Key Stage 4 (Senior High School) Teachers in BARMM TOT

Approximately 200 participants, composed of Schools Division Office personnel and school heads, from the 11 divisions of the BARMM were trained during the TOT conducted in Davao City. ### **Consultation with the Academe for the Senior High School (SHS) Curriculum Review**

28 November 2022

ACTRP Deputy Director Dr. Marlene Ferido and ACTRP Administrative Officer Ms. Liza V. Caminong attended DepEd's consultation meeting with representatives from different universities. The consultation aimed to gather inputs from the academe on the knowledge and skills needed by SHS learners in the context of emerging trends, issues, and concerns in the workplace. Dr. Ferido gave a presentation on the State of Play in Philippine SHS Education, drawn from studies conducted by the Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS) and ACTRP, as well as from reports pertaining to SHS graduates' readiness for the job market. A panel discussion followed that focused on the readiness of K-12 graduates for tertiary education.

## **CONSULTATION WORKSHOP**

### **Consultation with the Industry Sector for the Senior High School (SHS) Curriculum Review**

1 December 2022

Dr. Marlene Ferido and Ms. Liza V. Caminong also attended DepEd's consultation meeting with representatives from different employer groups. The consultation gathered inputs from industry representatives on the knowledge and skills needed by SHS learners in the context of emerging trends, issues, and concerns in the workplace. Dr. Ferido presented the State of Play in Philippine SHS Education, drawn from studies conducted by the Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS) and ACTRP, as well as from reports pertaining to SHS graduates' readiness for the job market. The panel discussion that ensued deliberated on the preparedness of SHS graduates to enter the workforce.

## **RETOOLING OF SPED CENTERS INTO INCLUSIVE AND SUPPORTIVE CENTERS OF LEARNING (ISCL) PROJECT ACTIVITIES**

### **Consortium Meetings**

30 June, 15 August, 27 August, 29 August, 26 October 2022

ACTRP participated in regular meetings regarding the Retooling of SPED Centers into Inclusive and Supportive Centers of Learning (ISCL) Project. The

project aims to formulate the relevant and effective design and programming mechanisms for the ISCL to effectively support learners with disabilities in the Bangsamoro Region. MBHTE–BARMM created a Regional Technical Working Group (RTWG) for the conceptualization of the Inclusive Schools Approach (ISA) as part of developing the prototype for the ISCL Project. The Teacher's Gallery (TTG) initiated a Consortium with ACTRP and the UP College of Allied Medical Professions (CAMP) to establish institutional support and backup for the co-designing, development, and implementation of activities and outputs.

### **Interviews and Report Writing**

#### **"From the Margins to the Mainstream: Mapping out Learners with Functional Difficulties in the General Educational System"**

August–November 2022

ACTRP conducted interviews and a debriefing session with the enumerators who administered MBHTE's survey on children with functional difficulties in 11 Schools Division Offices (SDOs) in BARMM. The survey used the KaISA Adapted Child Functioning Module for Child Finding, which was originally developed by UNICEF and the Washington Group Statistics on Disability. ACTRP, together with Mr. John Paul Cruz, an expert on matters pertaining to the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, and the faculty researchers from the UP Special Education Area, produced a report about the preparation for and conduct of the survey. The report aims to guide the MBHTE in further improving its succeeding data collection procedures in identifying children with functional difficulties.

### **Development of Guidelines**

#### **Guidelines in using the KaISA Adapted UNICEF/ Washington Group Child Functioning Module for Child Finding**

August–November 2022

ACTRP developed guidelines in collecting data on children with functional difficulties in BARMM using the KaISA Adapted Child Functioning Module for Child Finding, a screening tool for identifying children, ages 5–17 years old, with functional difficulties. The guidelines were developed based on the interviews conducted by ACTRP with nominated enumerators, who were involved in the

pilot survey carried out in all SDOs in BARMM. The guidelines include an introduction to the KaISA Child Functioning Module, general instructions for the enumerators, instructions for its use during DepEd's Early Registration activities, instructions for its use during LGU child-finding activities, and instructions on data processing after the administration of the tool.

### **Training of Mentors on the Foundations of the KaISA to Reach Every Child Program**

30 August–3 September 2022

ACTRP provided technical assistance to the KaISA to Reach Every Child Program of the MBHTE through Education Pathways to Peace in Mindanao and The Teacher's Gallery, as it initiated and led the Inclusive Schools Approach (ISA) in BARMM. A five-day training of mentors was conducted from August 30 to September 3. ACTRP Convenor Dr. Marie Therese Bustos, together with the faculty researchers from the UP College of Education (Special Education), Dr. May Cabutihan, Dr. Frances Olivia Magtoto, and Dr. Lutze-Sol Aplaoon Vidal and CAMP faculty delivered lectures during the said training.

### **Division-level Training-Workshop on the Foundations of the KaISA to Reach Every Child Program**

19–29 September 2022

The attendees of the five-day Training of Mentors cascaded the Training-Workshop on the Foundations of the KaISA to Reach Every Child Program in the 11 SDOs of BARMM, with guidance from the consortium, including ACTRP. This was done in six batches: (1) Lanao Cluster (Lanao Del Sur 1 and 2); (2) Maguindanao Cluster (Maguindanao 1 and 2) and Marawi last September 19 to 21; (3) Special Geographic Area (SGA) and Cotabato City last September 22 to 24; (4) Lamitan and Basilan; (5) Sulu; and (6) Tawi-tawi last September 27 to 29, 2022.

### **Regional Technical Working Group (RTWG) Debriefing and Meeting**

30 September–2 October 2022

ACTRP, as part of the consortium initiated by The Teacher's Gallery (TTG) for the RTWG, contributed to the debriefing meeting held in Davao del Norte. Regional-level data analysis, action planning, and co-designing session for the School Accessibility Walkthrough and transition training for the Inclusive Schools Approach were conducted. Dr. Marie Therese Bustos, together with research officers Julie Anne Dela Cruz, Karizza Loberiza, and Junice Nepomuceno, represented ACTRP in the said event.

### **Field Work: Pre-Walkthrough Visit and Resource Mapping in a School in Maguindanao**

11 October 2022

ACTRP prepared the design for the pre-walkthrough activity and crafted instruments to be used to determine the readiness of Timanan Central Elementary School in Maguindanao, the pilot school for the Inclusive and Supportive Centers of Learning (ISCL) Project, for inclusive education. During the pre-walkthrough activity, interviews with the school head and the local government unit (LGU) personnel were conducted. ACTRP research officer Julie Anne Dela Cruz joined this data gathering activity.

### **Field Work: School Accessibility Walkthrough in a School in Maguindanao**

18–20 October 2022

ACTRP provided technical assistance during the actual School Accessibility Walkthrough, spearheaded by TTG. The Program used the data gathered from the pre-walkthrough visit and resource mapping to finalize the instruments for the actual walkthrough to assess the readiness for inclusive education of Timanan Central Elementary School in Maguindanao. An accessibility audit was conducted using a checklist adapted from existing accessibility guidelines. Other means of data gathering involved the conduct of interviews with learners, class observations, and focus group discussions (FGDs) with the teachers and parents of students in the school.

### **Development of Two Assessment Frameworks and Tools for the Alternative Learning System (ALS) Micro-certification**

With funding from UNICEF and in collaboration with the University of Melbourne Assessment Research Centre (ARC) and DepEd-BAE, ACTRP is involved in a project that aims to develop assessment frameworks and tools for two additional capabilities in DepEd's ALS Life Skills program, using the method employed in the previous feasibility study conducted in 2020–2021. The project builds on the approach used by

ARC and ACTRP in the feasibility study, which is strongly collaborative and based on a commitment to research co-design with clients and partners.

Methodologies for the development process with a corresponding work plan will be initially developed. Consultation meetings will be conducted with a broad range of education stakeholders to gather insights on the new capabilities to be included in the ALS micro-certification assessment frameworks, with participants to be identified in consultation with the ALS Micro-certification Advisory Group.

The research team will develop two additional assessment frameworks, instruments/tools, and corresponding manuals to facilitate administration



and data analysis, modeling after the development process for the two existing tools. The capabilities to be covered will be identified by DepEd–BAE, prioritized based on research evidence and endorsed by the ALS Micro-certification Advisory Group.

### **Technical Assistance to DepEd for the Review and Revision of the Senior High School Curriculum**

Through Australia’s Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT)’s Bridging Program and the Philippine Business for Education, ACTRP will provide technical assistance to the DepEd for the review and revision of the SHS curriculum. To guide DepEd, a comparison of international high-performing SHS systems will be done, which will yield some practices that could be adapted. Simultaneously, nationwide consultation workshops will be held with stakeholders, namely parents, students, employers, and the academe. Information from the comparative study and the consultations will determine the foci of the review and revisions of the SHS curriculum. As with the K-to-10 review, the review will focus on the alignment of the intended, implemented, assessed, and attained SHS curriculum.

## **ACTIVITIES**

### **Presentation of the Final Results of the Learning Loss Study using the NAT for Grades 6 and 10 Students in 2021**

ACTRP has been providing technical assistance to the DepEd–BEA in their study to measure learning loss of Grades 6 and 10 students in 2021 through the NAT by using item response theory framework. ACTRP is expected to present the results of its analysis of the NAT 2018 and Computer-based NAT 2021 in January 2023 to DepEd–BEA directors, chiefs, and staff.

### **Continuation of research and technical assistance to the Retooling of SPED Centers to ISCL Project**

ACTRP will provide technical assistance to the consortium initiated by TTG in its implementation of the transition training in Timanan Central Elementary School in Maguindanao, the pilot school for the ISCL Project of the MBHTE–BARM. ACTRP is also expected to contribute to the training design,

training modules to be used, and submit a full documentation of the said event. There will also be a simulation for the whole school-inclusive schools approach, co-developed with consortium partners, MBHTE–BARM, and the Inclusion Reference Group (IRG). ACTRP will also submit the full documentation of the simulation and debriefing including the sustainability plan.

### **Outline of activities related to the Development of Two Assessment Frameworks and Tools for the ALS Micro-certification**

- Four (4) consultation meetings with stakeholders to cover the following
  - Application of micro-certification system to the two capabilities to be assessed
  - Nature, importance, and assessability of the two capabilities
  - Proposed method to be used in assessing the capabilities, including assessment design, administration, resources, and expertise requirements
- Four (4) workshops for teachers, practitioners, employers, or trainers who are observers of others who possess the capabilities
  - There will be separate discussions for each capability, as well as joint sessions for “cross-fertilization” and efficiency when content is equally relevant to both capabilities.
- Development of implementation manual
  - Development of draft administration manuals for teachers, learners, and raters by the research team
  - Review of draft manual by Advisory Group
  - Incorporation of changes to the draft manual
  - Inclusion of guidelines on interpreting results of the assessments for teaching and learning purposes

  - Based on the previous feasibility study, a similar or appropriately adjusted model will be adopted and implemented.
  - Recruitment of ALS program administrators and teachers from school divisions representing a variety of locations (e.g., two rural, two urban) across Luzon,

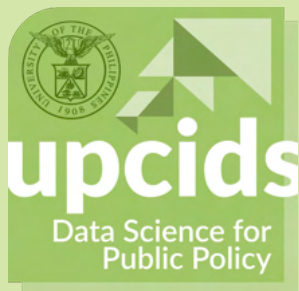

Second, it strives to engage a community of researchers in the University and encourage the pursuit of interdisciplinary, problem-oriented research through high-level quantitative analyses. Finally, it seeks to convene multidisciplinary teams of social scientists, humanists, and scientists to research issues in the public sector.

## ACTIVITIES FROM JULY TO DECEMBER 2022

### MEETINGS

#### Data Science Working Group Meetings on Degree Programs for Data Science

12 July 2022, 7 September 2022,  
16 November 2022

DSPPP convenes the Data Science Working Group, which is composed of faculty members, researchers, and high-level officials of different UP units. Since its creation, the Working Group has tackled the idea of offering degree programs in data science within different UP units. Recently, UP has approved several degree programs in data science to be offered in various UP units—the most notable of which is the Ph.D. in Data Science, now offered by UP Diliman. Other degree programs in the field of data science include the Ph.D. in Artificial Intelligence (UPD) and Ph.D. by Research in Data Analytics and Informatics (UPB). More degree programs are under pre-curricular discussion with the Data Science Working Group. This includes the proposals for MSc. Degree Programs on Data Science in UP Open University; graduate degree program proposal in Digital Humanities in UP Visayas; and the BSc. in Data Science Proposal in UP Mindanao.

Part of the discussions in the Data Science Working Group that has also come into fruition is the creation of the **UP Data Commons**, a computing facility that includes several units of high-performance computing (HPC) machines that can be utilized for research, such as HPC tasks, programming applications/software, systems and web application development and deployment, data repositories and database systems development, and many others. DSPPP initiated UP Data Commons through the Program's **Open Data Project**.

### WRITESHOP

#### E-Governance Project: Audit of Local Information Systems and Capacities

21 September 2022

The research project on assessing the local information systems of select local government units (LGUs) conducted an online writeshop on finalizing the manuscript for submission to UP CIDS, led by DSPPP Research Fellow Assoc. Prof. Vladimer Kobayashi and Ms. Novy Aila Rivas, the

research consultant for the project. The writeshop highlighted the results of the topic modelling and analyses of the extracted data from the different ordinances digitally available in the official website of the select LGUs of the study. DSPPP Convenor Dr. Jalton Taguibao gave his inputs on how the manuscript can be written and improved based on how the extracted data can be presented in the context of e-governance.

### MEETINGS

#### Analyzing Filipino Values through Social Data (Culture Data Science Project)

22 June 2022, 15 July 2022, 17 August 2022,  
3 October 2022, 25 November 2022

This research project is in partnership with UP DEPPPO to look at the relevance of the *pakikipagkapwa* model in modern Philippine societal interactions. The project also aims to understand interactions in social media platforms through scraped data. The project commenced with DSPPP Research Fellows Dr. Maria Margarita Lavidas and Assoc. Prof. Vladimer Kobayashi leading the project; it has also applied for ethics clearance before data gathering. Several offshoot activities are also being planned for 2023, with some already conducted in 2022.

### WEBINAR

#### Data Scraping for Social Research

29 November 2022

As part of capability-building activities for UP faculty, students, and researchers, DSPPP initiated an online lecture-workshop, entitled “Data Scraping for Social Research.” This activity tackles the use of scraping valuable pieces of information from data-rich digital and online platforms. Learning how to harness data readily available and open to the public allows researchers to access larger data sets and new methodologies in data analysis. The webinar lecture-workshop was conducted by DSPPP Research Fellow Assoc. Prof. Vladimer Kobayashi, and Ms. Novy Aila Rivas, research consultant of the Culture Data Science Project.

### MEETINGS

#### Ad Hoc Committee on Open Data Policy of UP Diliman

13 September 2022; 3 October 2022;  
18 November 2022; 6 December 2022

DSPPP initiated the Open Data Policy Project, led by its former Convenor and current UP Diliman



Chancellor, Dr. Fidel Nemenzo. As the Open Data Policy is now imposed in UP Diliman, the need to craft an Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) has become imperative. The Ad Hoc Committee on UP Open Data was tasked to draft the IRR for the Open Data Policy. Representing DSPPP in the said Committee was Mr. Julius Paolo Basa, the Program's Senior Project Assistant. The IRR's initial draft is expected to be released in the first quarter of 2023, with the draft undergoing revisions and technical reviews from different stakeholders and affected sectors of the said policy.

## UPCOMING ACTIVITIES AND OUTPUTS FOR JANUARY TO JUNE 2023

DSPPP will continue pursuing activities related to its research agenda, particularly on the governance of information systems and labor analytics. The Program will also commence the activities related to new research projects with UP DEPPPO, specifically in Culture Data Science and Business Analytics. The outputs of these research activities will be submitted to UP CIDS for publication. Different capacity-building programs will also be pursued as part of DSPPP's two-pronged thrust, particularly on information system capacities at the local government unit (LGU) level. The Program will also continue to serve as a platform for discussion among the different units who are part of the Data Science Working Group, and assist in the precurricular discussion of new degree program offerings in the field of data science. Furthermore, the Program shall

continue to take part in the discussions of the ongoing draft of the UP Diliman Open Data Policy IRR, as well as serve as an avenue to convene for the creation of the UP Intelligent Systems Institute (UP ISI).

## ACTIVITIES

### Continue serving as a member of the Ad Hoc Committee on UP Diliman's Open Data Policy

DSPPP, represented by its Senior Project Assistant Julius Paulo C. Basa, shall continue in the Ad Hoc Committee on the Open Data Policy of UP Diliman. Work in the Committee is expected to include discussions on how data can be de-identified by researchers, ethical considerations of the datasets to be published into the open data portal, conducting supplemental studies on the experience of other higher education institutions (HEIs) both locally and internationally in the implementation of a research-based open data policy. DSPPP shall also continue to be directly involved in the review, revision, and proposal of alternative settings to the IRR of the UP Diliman Open Data Policy.

### Continue the Culture Data Science Project with UP DEPPPO

DSPPP shall continue the data analysis and drafting of the manuscripts for the Culture Data Science Project, which will be led by its Program Research Fellows, Dr. Maria Margarita Lavides and Assoc. Prof. Vladimer Kobayashi, together with UP DEPPPO faculty members. Face-to-face writeshops and training activities for data analysis using scraped data will also be held.

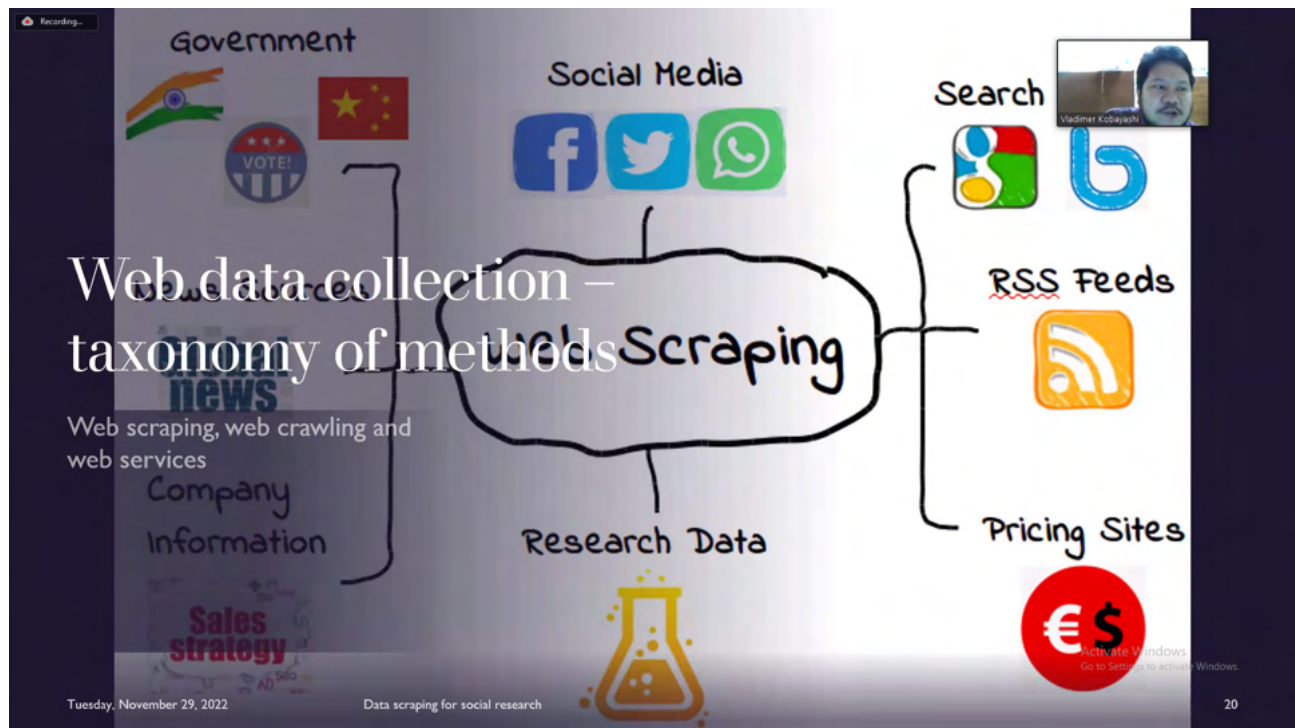
### Serve as a support platform for the UP Intelligent Systems Institute (UP ISI)

DSPPP will serve as a potential platform in operationalizing the new UP ISI—stemming from the early work on convening the Data Science Working Group—and concurrently be the secretariat of the working group. The Program will also be involved in present and future projects and plans in developing UP ISI.

### Convene the Data Science Working Group

DSPPP shall continue convening the Data Science Working Group, which will hold meetings all throughout 2023. Precurricular discussions on new program offerings in other units shall form part of most of the discussions. Specifically, the graduate data science degree programs proposed by the UP Open University,

### Capacity Building Program on the Sustainable Development Goals at the Local Level

With the expected arrival of a new Program research fellow for the year 2023, new capacity building activities are planned in line with the Program's research agenda. The possible capacity building program will capacitate LGUs in data-driven monitoring and evaluation (M&E), particularly of LGUs' performance in achieving the targets and subtargets in the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The capacity building activity is expected to yield a training module, as well as several manuscripts on the LGUs' experience in monitoring SDGs.

# PROGRAM ON ESCAPING THE MIDDLE-INCOME TRAP: CHAINS FOR CHANGE

EMIT C4C has three projects: a) big data analytics (BDA) on manufacturing, labor, and exports; b) action research on agriculture and fisheries value chains; and c) action research on business-for-peace in Mindanao. #### Women Nurturing Peace: Capacity Enhancement Workshop for the Bangsamoro Women Auxiliary Brigade (BIWAB) of Camp Bilal 25–26 July 2022 at Misamis Oriental


The activity, in which twenty-one (21) women participated, voiced out the aspirations and goals of BIWAB members. The facilitators gave updates on the Bangsamoro Transitional Governance that mentioned women's voices in the Bangsamoro Government Parliamentary System. The activity also had inputs on how to become effective facilitators and write convincing project proposals.

### LEARNING EVENT AND DIALOGUE

#### Learning Event and Interfaith and Multicultural Dialogue 22–23 October 2022 at Bukidnon

From March to June 2022, the Program along with its partners (Hineleban Foundation, Pakigdait Foundation, MSU IIT IPDM, PrC-RSM) and with the funding support of the Embassy of the Kingdom of Netherlands in Manila, conducted a series of training for former combatants and key members of the NWMF for developing, implementing, monitoring, and evaluating projects. The training participants were again invited for a recap of lessons and a gleaning of project experiences. The event was also

The activity presented the results of the rapid assessment survey, enhanced the survey by asking additional and clarificatory questions, and presented the draft study to generate feedback. The activity was supported by the ILO with the assistance of UP CIDS, MSU IIT IPDM, and Pakigdait, Inc. Some of the workshop questions included: “What are the sources of income in your barangay/municipality?” “What are the sources of information that people use to search for employment?” “How far would you go to look for employment (e.g., outside the Philippines; other provinces within BARMM; other provinces within Mindanao; other provinces outside Mindanao; or it does not matter, provided there are jobs)?”

### **FOCUS GROUP DISCUSSION**

#### **FGD on Techno-Demo**

16 December 2022 at the PEF Office

EMIT C4C’s Senior Research Analyst Jane Lynn Capacio conducted an FGD with key officials of PEF who are knowledgeable on coffee production. The FGD also tackled how they implemented a technology demonstration project. The intention was to document how productivity-enhancing demonstration projects are implemented and what factors make smallholders accept—or reject—new technologies.

### **ROUNDTABLE DISCUSSION**

#### **RTD on a proposed project**

16 July 2022

EMIT C4C organized an RTD aimed at soliciting the ideas of UP senior faculty members and researchers regarding a proposed history project of a government agency. The RTD surfaced ideas on possible themes, researchers, and modalities for research engagement.

## **UPCOMING ACTIVITIES AND OUTPUTS FOR JANUARY TO JUNE 2023**

For January to June 2023, EMIT C4C plans to publish the GLOWCORP and LAMPCO action research reports as monographs of case studies. These papers’ findings currently await final validation sessions with LAMPCO, to be conducted on-site in Compostela Valley. The Program will also study agriculture technology projects to see how yield-enhancing initiatives could become acceptable to smallholder farmers, who tend to avoid costs and risks.

EMIT C4C will wrap up the business-for-peace project with the Embassy of the Kingdom of Netherlands with an end-conference with various stakeholders that it worked with for the past three years. This activity will be held in February in Mindanao. The lessons from this project, along with the conference proceedings, will then be submitted to UP CIDS for publication.

The Program will also spearhead a book project aimed at documenting the history of a national government agency. The project intends to produce an academic book and would thus require a research team. The project will start in March 2023 and be finished by the end of 2025. From January until June 2023, EMIT C4C will draw up the initial research themes, build the team of researchers and editors, gather initial data, and draw up an initial iteration of the concept note.

### **ACTIVITIES**

#### **Validation of action research findings to LAMPCO in Compostela Valley**

members and management team. The activity will provide an opportunity to clarify the findings, as well as give a space for asking questions, sharing reflections, and providing comments. From this validation exercise, EMIT C4C and PEF will incorporate the comments and submit the final version to UP CIDS.

#### **End conference of the Business-for-Peace Project**

EMIT C4C and its partners will organize an end conference to summarize outputs, synthesize lessons, and propose mechanisms for moving forward. The conference will most likely include a presentation of the projects of the MILF's NWMF.

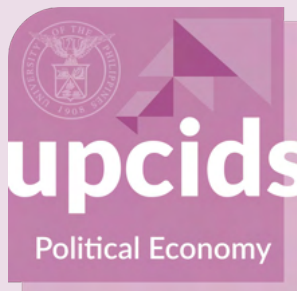
#### **Roundtable discussion on the proposed themes of the planned history book project**

conduct an initial data gathering to see the scope of the written works on the agency. The results of this initial data gathering will be shared in an RTD with the agency's key officials.

These will be in the form of social media posts with infographics and case materials used for discussions with social enterprises, cooperatives, and peoples' organizations.

## ACTIVITIES FROM JULY TO DECEMBER 2022

### MEETING

#### Multistakeholder Consultation on Trade and Development

27 October 2022

The multistakeholder consultation was co-sponsored by Social Watch Philippines, UP Resilience Institute, and the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD). With the theme “Stepping Back from the Brink: Minimizing Vulnerability and Building Resilience in an Increasingly Volatile World,” the consultation on trade and development issues with the academe and civil society organizations was a follow-up to the 2019 multistakeholders meeting, which was held as part of the Philippine process leading up to the 15th session of the UNCTAD in 2021.

During the consultation, stakeholders shared their analyses and policy recommendations on the following areas: (1) disaster risk reduction and

climate change; (2) economic resilience, and; (3) social resilience. The inputs will be shared with the Department of Foreign Affairs in an effort to enrich the Philippine trade and development agenda in multilateral negotiations.

### ROUNDTABLE DISCUSSION

#### Retrofitting Small Vessels Toward a Green and Inclusive Maritime Industry

5 December 2022

In December, the PEP conducted a RTD with representatives from the government, academe, and industry to discuss prospects for the hybridization of small vessels in the counter, as well as to identify policy gaps, research and development needs, and available expertise and resources for the promotion of an inclusive and green maritime sector. The discussion featured a presentation by Assistant Professor Paul Rodgers, UP Diliman College of Engineering and PEP Project Leader, that proposed retrofitting small vessels with a hybrid power source. The presentation was based on the PEP policy brief, “Hybrid Energy for Small Vessels for Range Extension and Emissions Reduction.”

## CONFERENCE PRESENTATION

### IDEAs Conference: Development Strategies in an Uncertain and Unequal World

3–5 August 2022

Organized by the International Development Economics Associates (IDEAs), the conference tackled varying experiences of developing countries over the course of the pandemic, as well as possible strategies to address issues such as the need for stable and decent work, stronger social protections, access to technology, and sustainable production systems. Dr. Antoinette Raquiza, PEP Convenor, gave a presentation, entitled “Investigating the Philippine Services Export Economy.” The activity was held on 3–5 August 2022 in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

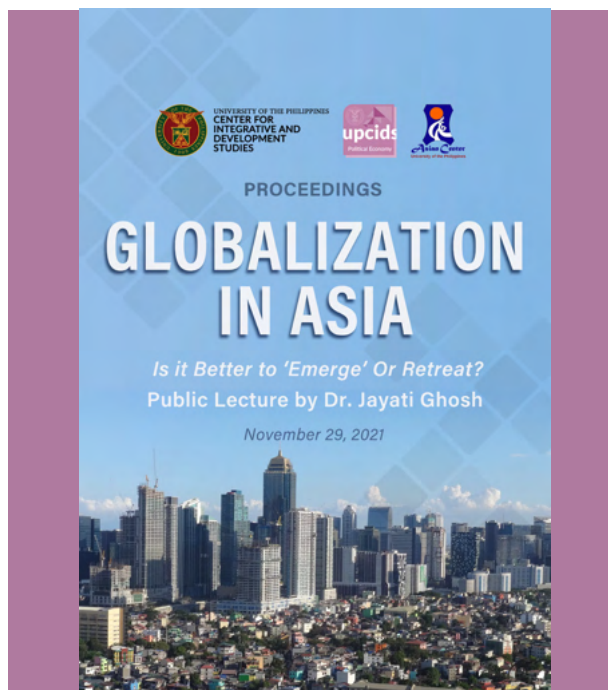

- Philippine Innovation Act and the University-Industry Nexus



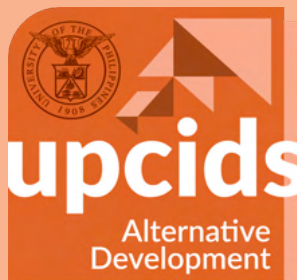

Last 24 August 2022, AltDev Convenor Dr. Eduardo Tadem discussed the concept of wealth tax in the

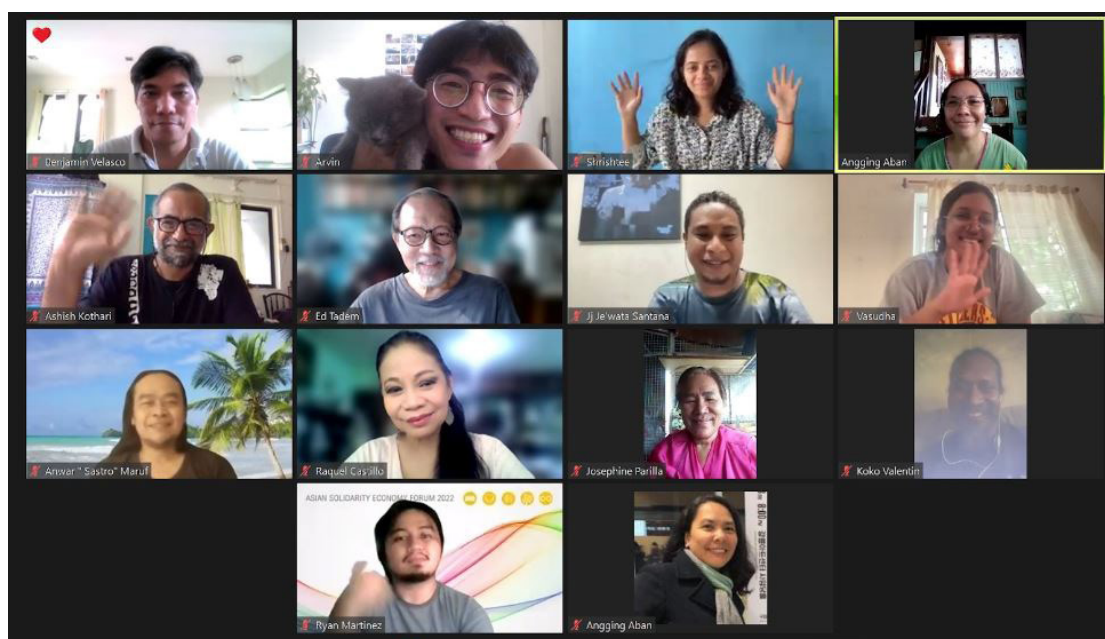

## UPCOMING ACTIVITIES AND OUTPUTS FOR JANUARY TO JUNE 2023

AltDev's documentation work is one of the Program's main thrusts. Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, AltDev has persisted in its work to document not only alternative development practices but also COVID-19 community responses in the past years (Vol. 1 and 2). AltDev is also working on a book project for international publication that will feature the alternative practices of peoples across the Southeast Asian region. Alongside these projects, AltDev is looking to collaborate with the Governance in Conflict Network for a research project on connections between climate, governance, and conflict as they affect the population.

As countries and regions are continuously opening their borders for face-to-face interactions, MASSA is already planning for in-person P2P exchanges by the first quarter of 2023: one with Vikalp Sangam; and another with GTA weavers: Vikalp Sangam, Crianza Mutua Mexico, and Crianza Mutua Colombia. The result of this major event will serve as guidelines in holding the 4th Regional Conference on Alternatives, which is also assumed to be organized in the latter part of 2023. Considering that many Indonesians are MASSA members, there is also the possibility to continue the engagement within the ACSC/APF 2023 in Indonesia to maintain and enhance platforms accommodating the Alternatives discourse, such as the CS, and to strengthen regional solidarity.

## ACTIVITIES

### Documentation and Publication of Alternative Practices in Southeast Asia

Currently, the Program is in the process of completing the second volume (Vol. 2) of the Southeast Asian Monograph on alternative practices, consisting of fourteen (14) case studies of grassroots alternative practices: thirteen (13) from Southeast Asia (i.e., Philippines, Thai-Burma Border, Cambodia, Timor Leste, Indonesia, Laos, Burma/Myanmar, Thailand) and one (1) from South Asia (i.e., Northeast India). This Monograph will add to the existing database of Alternatives that AltDev has started in 2018.

### Regional P2P Exchanges

In the first quarter of 2023, MASSA will co-organize two P2P Exchanges/Dialogues. AltDev will be its interim secretariat:

- (1.) The first dialogue is the P2P Exchange between MASSA and Vikalp Sangam, a regional platform for ecological and community-centered alternatives throughout India.
- (2.) The second dialogue is the exchange between the Weavers of GTA: Vikalp Sangam, Crianza Mutua Mexico, Crianza Mutua Colombia, and MASSA. Representatives of regional networks from South Asia, Latin America, and Southeast Asia will come together for this weavers' dialogue.

### Research collaboration within GIC Network

AltDev has committed to be part of a GIC collaborative research project on climate and governance to present Global South perspectives on these issues, specifically narratives from marginalized communities in Southeast Asia. The proposal writing for this project shall commence in early 2023, with AltDev as part of the team of writers.

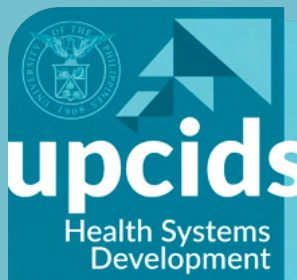

The **Program on Health Systems Development** (PHSD) houses work that investigates problems and innovates solutions for health systems. Although this mission inevitably applies scientific rigor to the *parts* of health systems, the goal is to improve the *whole* in terms of overall performance and ultimate outcomes. Its flagship project is the Philippine Primary Care Studies (PPCS), with three sites: UP Health Service (UHS), the rural health unit (RHU) in Samal, Bataan, and the RHU in Bulusan, Sorsogon.

### ONLINE TRAINING

#### Training of Samal Healthcare Workers on the EHR (Open MRS)

7 July 2022

PHSD Information Officer Cara Galingana and IT Committee Member Ryan Esconde conducted a training session on the EHR (Open MRS software) for the rural site to emphasize the need for EHR use, especially for telemedicine consultations. The event also included a question-and-answer portion after the training to ensure that all concerns were addressed.

### ONLINE MEETING

#### Samal RHU Meeting to Promote Telemedicine Use

14 July 2022

PPCS site staff attended the RHU staff update meeting. This meeting was attended by all of the RHU's healthcare workers (i.e., doctors, nurses, midwives, barangay health workers). During the meeting, the PPCS staff emphasized telemedicine use in their community. They reiterated that this can help decongest the RHU and can be used by those

who conduct follow-up checkups or those who ask for medicine refills.

### ONLINE MEETING

#### Meeting with Dinalupihan and Samal MHO

27 July 2022

Dr. Leonila Dans, PHSD's Project Leader for the rural site, and PHSD Convenor Dr. Antonio Dans, together with the PPCS staff, held a meeting with the Dinalupihan and Samal MHO and health officials to discuss the impact of a strengthened primary care system at the urban, rural, and remote sites. The essential functions of primary care were enumerated and areas to be strengthened were also discussed. A checklist on how to start primary care in their community was shown in order to ensure proper management of funds.

### ONLINE MEETING

#### Meeting with Bulusan MHO

2 August 2022

PHSD Convenor Dr. Antonio Dans, together with the PPCS Bulusan site staff, held a meeting with the Bulusan MHO, Dr. Pura Clores, to discuss EHR concerns. Importance of data entry on the same day was reiterated, and it was agreed that this will be done by all the RHU staff. Dr. Dans also mentioned that PPCS will be helping with the transition to the

## ONLINE MEETING

### Meeting with Samal MDs

Dr. Antonio Dans, together with the PPCS Samal site staff, met with Samal doctors to discuss how to improve telemedicine using video calls in barangay health stations. The doctors identified their difficulties with video calls, but were amenable to trying it with one patient a day. The data on video calls will be submitted to DOH in order to assess its usefulness for other communities.

## FACE TO FACE MEETING

### Meeting with Bulusan Mayor

17 August 2022

PHSD Senior Research Analyst Josephine T. Sanchez and Senior Project Officer Maria Rhodora N. Aquino, together with the Bulusan site staff, met with the

Bulusan mayor to inform him of the study's closure. Plans for the closure and hand-over activities were enumerated and thoroughly discussed. The mayor mentioned that he was grateful that their community was chosen for this study. He plans to continue the good processes PPCS started, such as continuous hiring of additional doctors in the RHU and partnering with different service delivery networks.

### ONLINE MEETING

#### Quality of Care Study Presentation of Pediatrics Residents, Part 1

23 September and 6 October 2022

PHSD Project Leader Dr. Leonila Dans facilitated the presentation of the pediatrics residents' data on six quality of care studies. This meeting was attended by all the PPCS staff. The presented data were the following: (1) turnaround time of consults in the primary care study; (2) acute gastroenteritis clinical practice guidelines (CPG) adherence; (3) frequency distribution of pediatric primary care cases; (4) asthma adherence; (5) telemedicine pediatric conditions and platforms; and (6) antibiotic prescription patterns. A question-and-answer portion was held after each presentation.

### ONLINE WEBINAR

#### DOH Health Forum

20 October 2022

Dr. Leonila Dans presented the PPCS utilization of consults in the DOH Health Forum. This webinar was attended by different stakeholders and medical organizations. During the webinar, emphasis was given to the utilization of consults in the rural sites

compared to remote and urban sites. The increase in the rural site's (Samal) utilization was attributed to close coordination between the LGU and the RHU.

### ONLINE MEETING

#### Meeting with Bulusan MHO

10 November 2022

Dr. Antonio Dans, together with the PPCS Bulusan site staff, held a meeting with the Bulusan MHO to discuss the transition of the EMR from Open MRS to the approved system by DOH E-Konsulta. Dr. Dans reiterated that whatever program DOH chooses, the PPCS team will help the Bulusan RHU in transitioning their medical records.

### ONLINE MEETING

#### Meeting with Samal Governor

24 November 2022

Dr. Dans, together with the PPCS Samal site staff, held a meeting with the Samal governor and some local officials to present a background on PPCS. There was a brief presentation of PPCS' results and its work for the past three years. A discussion followed after the presentation, focusing mainly on outcomes, particularly on the use of EMR and

public–private partnerships when it comes to the service delivery network.

## ONLINE TRAININGS

### UpToDate Club

28 July, 25 August, 1 October, 24 November 2022

PHSD Senior Research Analyst Josephine T. Sanchez facilitated the UpToDate Club with Dr. Antonio Dans, Dr. Leonila Dans, and other guest doctors as part of the panel. BHWs, midwives, and nurses presented topics they recently encountered in their community, using the UpToDate application as a source of information. Topics discussed included conjunctivitis, boils, dengue fever, bronchitis, and acute sinusitis. After the short presentation, a question-and-answer portion was conducted to answer the attendees' inquiries. A short recap of learnings and insights was also given at the end of the session.

## UPCOMING ACTIVITIES AND OUTPUTS FOR JANUARY TO JUNE 2023

The PPCS officially ended at the three study sites last 15 December 2022. Nevertheless, PHSD still plans on supporting the sites, which will be pilot sites for the DOH for the E-Konsulta program. Other continuing activities include support to the EHR transition for the rural and remote sites, PPCS website development, and workforce/manpower development through the use of the UpToDate app, which will be done once or twice a month, similar to a journal club.

PPCS has a lot of data to process and analyze for the next six months. There are also many papers that are currently being written. As such, the Program will focus on completing the following papers:

- (1.) Patient satisfaction
- (2.) EMR satisfaction
- (3.) UpToDate satisfaction
- (4.) Quality of Care Papers
  - (a.) Turn around time of consults in the primary care study
  - (b.) Acute gastroenteritis CPG adherence
  - (c.) Frequency distribution of pediatric primary care cases
  - (d.) Asthma adherence


- (e.) Telemedicine pediatric conditions and platforms
- (f.) Antibiotic prescription patterns

Other activities that are still being considered, depending on the availability of funds, are the following: post-hoc analyses/studies, and annual surveys in the pilot sites to assess DOH's E-Konsulta program.

## ACTIVITIES

- (1.) Continuous support to primary care clinics at the three sites through telephone correspondence and online meetings. The Program will continue to give technical assistance in the transition of electronic medical records, once DOH has finalized the program that will be used for E-Konsulta. PHSD will also continue PPCS website development, so that policymakers will be able to see the study's results, which they can subsequently use for policy development.
- (2.) Processing and analyzing Year 3 survey data across the three sites. Surveys conducted include: UpToDate usage, patient satisfaction survey, EHR acceptance and use survey, health care worker satisfaction survey, and outpatient and inpatient service utilization. The data that was analyzed will be the source of information for future papers to be written by PPCS writers.
- (3.) Conducting monthly primary care training among healthcare workers with the UpToDate Club. PHSD will continue the manpower/workforce development of the rural and remote sites as long as they are interested to learn. Volunteer healthcare workers from each barangay in Samal and Bulusan will be encouraged to discuss the topics (i.e., illness) that they have encountered in the barangay health station in the past few months. Afterwards, a guest doctor will give their recommendations on the topic discussed.
- (4.) Launching community engagement material primarily through digital platforms (e.g., PPCS website). PHSD plans to relaunch the PPCS website, which contains information on primary care. The papers that were

published and the results of the study will be posted on the website. PHSD also plans to invite various stakeholders, such as DOH and PhilHealth, to this event. The Program hopes that the website will be able to aid in spreading awareness of primary care and its significance.

## UPCOMING ACTIVITIES AND OUTPUTS FOR JANUARY TO JUNE 2023

SSP will continue to advocate for and promote interest on significant shifts and developments in Philippine foreign policy and strategic studies by contributing to the growing discourse on the field. Through leading and participating in research initiatives, capacity-building activities, and information-sharing endeavors, SSP in 2023 will continue to pursue relevance by staying vigilant in observing transformations in the international and regional landscape and how these impact the country’s foreign and security policies, as well as its overall development. In this regard, SSP intends to implement projects and initiatives that not only engage and cater to the strategic studies community but to the Filipino public at large. This will contribute to SSP’s goal to widen its reach, in terms of age demographics, by tapping more young professionals as resource persons, and in terms of geographical reach, by extending networks and audiences locally and internationally.

The Katipunan Dialogue Podcast series has been one of SSP’s major accomplishments in 2022, allowing the Program to explore and enhance its understanding of prevailing traditional and nontraditional security issues and, in turn, produce and share content (in the form of podcasts) easily digestible by the public. SSP intends to maximize

the project’s potential by exploring more topics and issues and tapping experts in the country and abroad. For 2023, six (6) new episodes are being developed. As such, the first half of 2023 is dedicated to the podcasts’ preparation, including finalizing the topics and inviting guest speakers.

SSP also intends to produce research papers and conduct a roundtable discussion to discuss Strategic Philippine Foreign Policy in the next six (6) years. With a new administration, policy priorities are once again shifting, with a new National Security Strategy developed. SSP will also contribute to debates surrounding the new security strategy and the overall outlook for national security as it relates to Philippine foreign policy. Initial topics of interest for SSP papers include cybersecurity and maritime security. These topics, in SSP’s observation, are significant to the Philippine context but have been given less attention in recent years, especially in policy making. The first half of 2023 is intended to finalize these topics and contact possible authors. Meanwhile, the roundtable discussion is planned to be executed in the first half of 2023.

SSP is once again partnering with Konrad Adenauer Stiftung (KAS) for the 2023 iteration of the podcast. The next series will feature six (6) new episodes, with each one joined one to two experts. The first half of 2023 will be focus on conducting consultations with possible resource persons. Logistical planning for recording of at least three (3) episodes, as well as finalizing the partnership with KAS, are also priorities. So far, the initial set of topics include Indo-Pacific strategies and relations, the One China policy and its implications for the region and the Philippines, cyber strategy, and regional maritime security.

### Strategic Philippine Foreign Policy in the Marcos Administration: Analysis and Projections

This is a white paper/policy brief that intends to assess current trends and transformations in the regional strategic environment, such as economic integration, diplomacy, and regional security, and its implications for the Philippines’ strategic posture under the Marcos administration. It will provide

recommendations to assist the new administration in surveying its strategic options in the next years and building its capacity for future strategic analysis as it relates to Philippine foreign policy. The paper is intended to be produced within the first half of 2023.

### **Re-evaluating Japan's Middle Power Diplomacy Discussion Paper**

The paper utilizes a role-based theory to reassess Japan's economic, security, and foreign policies in recent decades and understand its movement toward a more proactive stance in regional security affairs. Despite Japan's "abnormal" nature, constituted by its pacifist constitution, dominant culture of antimilitarism, and dependence on the United States security alliance, the paper explores Japan's possibility to adopt a grand strategy as a "middle power." SSP plans to produce a draft of the discussion paper for review and publication by the first half of the year.

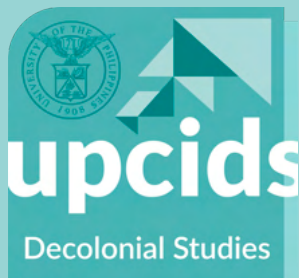
### **Roundtable Discussion on Strategic Philippine Foreign Policy in the Marcos Administration**

A roundtable discussion will be conducted in 2023 in partnership with SSP networks to discuss the subject matter presented. Experts and academics will be invited to discuss and exchange ideas on prevailing security issues, specifically in relation to strategic studies and foreign policy, toward the development of possible policy approaches for the country's decision-makers. The first half of the year will be dedicated towards conducting the roundtable discussion, and proceedings will be developed in the second half.

The **Decolonial Studies Program** (DSP) focuses on the varying dimensions of coloniality/modernity that continue to impact Global South societies and hinder their institutions from achieving their liberating potential.

## ACTIVITIES FROM JULY TO DECEMBER 2022

### DELEGATES

#### International Conference on Cohesive Societies (ICCS) 2022

6–8 September 2022

This three-day conference held in Singapore tackled the themes of faith, identity, and cohesion. Aside from a standard conference format of speeches, panel discussions, and plenary sessions, the ICCS also offered “community exploration tours” where attendees were toured through houses of worship that spotlighted various faiths. Alongside the main conference was a Youth Leaders Programme, which allowed young leaders to network with each other and discuss their own experiences and approaches to social cohesion.

### SEMINAR-WORKSHOP

#### Decolonial Approaches to Legislation

3–4 December 2022

A two-day workshop organized by the DSP and the Bangsamoro Parliament’s PRLS. The event explored,

discussed, and elaborated the usage of decolonial approaches in crafting legislative measures, such as bills and resolutions, in the Bangsamoro Parliament. “Decolonial Approaches to Legislation” illustrated the importance of decoloniality in the lived experiences and socio-cultural realities of the Moro peoples vis-à-vis the world of policy making and implementation through a panel discussion on the first day, and a hands-on workshop on the second day. The first day’s panelists were Dr. Nassef M. Adiong, Ms. Saima Mamalo, Mr. Vincent Casil, and Mr. Kebart Licayan, moderated by Dr. Marby Villaceran. On the second day, the workshop was facilitated by Atty. Archill Capistrano.

## UPCOMING ACTIVITIES AND OUTPUTS FOR JANUARY TO JUNE 2023

For the last six months of 2022, DSP oriented its focus on decolonial legislation and minority and identity narratives. The Program has decided to dedicate time and resources to aim for a Philippine legislative government arm sensitive to indigenous issues and more knowledgeable about decolonial theory and practice in policy making. This arm also intends to hold seminars and collaborate with other institutions in events concerning minorities and identity representation in digital archives.

To fulfill these major directives and goals for the first half of 2023, DSP currently plans to hold three major activities to facilitate these goals: two roundtable discussions on decolonizing policymaking and a two-day seminar-workshop on digital research on humanities and identities.

### ACTIVITIES

#### Roundtable Discussion on Decolonizing Policymaking

This roundtable discussion aims to identify the colonial structures still present in policy research and legislation. Some details already discussed in the previous “Decolonial Approaches to Legislation” seminar-workshop may be mentioned in this roundtable discussion as well, namely the lack of representation of the people being governed, the lack of participation of the common folk, and the influence of foreign legal systems despite its incongruence with the local people, among others. Afterwards, the discussion will center on how one can dismantle these colonial structures.

Some details already discussed in the previous “Decolonial Approaches to Legislation” seminar-workshop may be mentioned in this roundtable discussion as well, namely developing critical thinking according to the lens of decoloniality, identifying which aspects of the law does not apply to the local, which thinkers and authors are cited and studied, the origins of the teachers and students, and others. Afterwards, the discussion will tackle how one can dismantle these colonial structures.

### **Seminar on Identities and Digital Humanities Research**

This is a two-day workshop split over two weeks that aims to introduce researchers to doing computer-aided research in digitized archives, with a special focus on minority identities in the Philippines. Attendees will first learn about developments in the digital humanities and corpus-assisted discourse studies before using digital archives and repositories and open-access tools to explore various minority identities in the Philippines. Individuals and/or groups will then present their research and talk about the implications of minority representation on social dynamics, policy, and their vision of what it means to be a Filipino.

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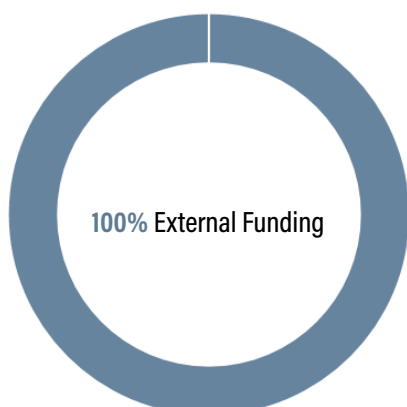
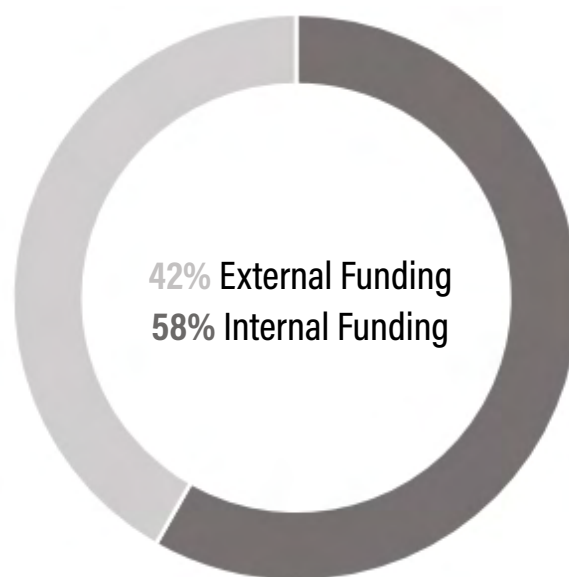


# EXTERNAL FUNDING

## JULY TO DECEMBER 2022

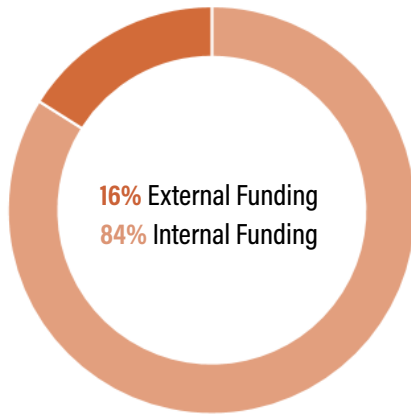
The UP President Executive Order 9 of September 1985 includes UP CIDS' objective of securing funds from public and private persons and agencies to support its policy research activities. In line with this objective, the Assessment, Curriculum, and Technology Research Program (ACTRP), Program on Alternative Development (AltDev), Program on Health Systems Development (PHSD), Program on Social and Political Change (PSPC), and Strategic Studies Program (SSP) were among the UP CIDS Research Programs that secured and utilized external funding in 2022.

The combined external funding of the aforementioned Programs comprised **42%** of the Center's funds for 2022, whereas the Center's internal funding allocated for the Research Programs amounted to **58%**. In contrast to the previous year, internal funding made up more of the total Research Program funds compared to external funding from outside sources.



### ASSESSMENT, CURRICULUM, AND TECHNOLOGY RESEARCH PROGRAM (ACTRP)

The Assessment, Curriculum, and Technology Research Program (ACTRP) is funded by the Assessment Research Centre (ARC) of the University of Melbourne (UoM) and the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT). In 2022, its projects also had other external sources, such as the Asian Development Bank (ADB); Australian Council for Educational Research, Indonesia; and The Teacher's Gallery, Inc. (TTG).



## PROGRAM ON ALTERNATIVE DEVELOPMENT (ALTDEV)

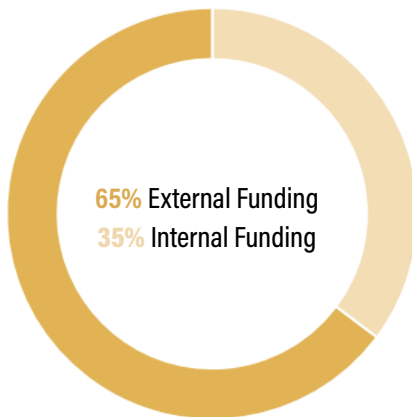
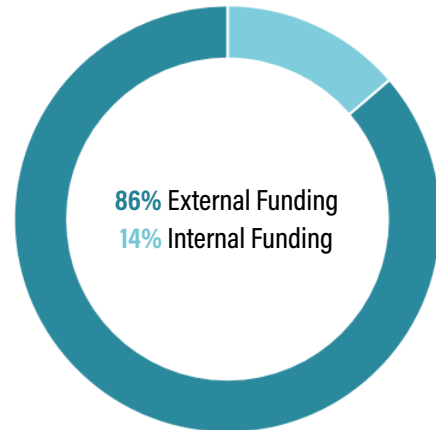
In 2022, the Program on Alternative Development (AltDev) was able to source external funds for its research activities. Its external funding comprised 16% of its total budget for 2022, whereas its internal UP CIDS funding made up the majority 84%.

AltDev's external funding were sourced from the following: (1) 11.11.11 Coalition of the North-South Flemish Movement; and (2) the Global Tapestry of Alternatives (GTA).

## PROGRAM ON HEALTH SYSTEMS DEVELOPMENT (PHSD)

For the Program on Health Systems Development (PHSD), majority of its funding came from external sources (86%). PHSD's external funding sources include the Department of Health-Advancing Health through Evidence-Assisted Decisions (DOH-AHEAD).

PHSD's external funding was used to support its research budget in terms of personnel services and indirect costs, and to provide healthcare benefits for patients in rural sites and geographically isolated and disadvantaged areas (GIDA).

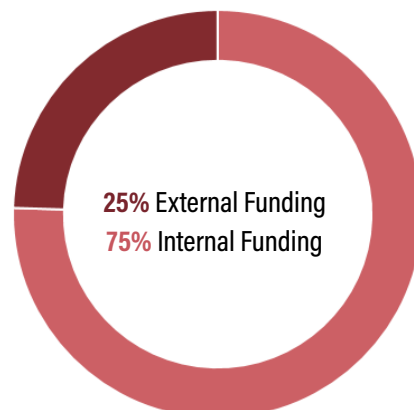


## PROGRAM ON SOCIAL AND POLITICAL CHANGE (PSPC)

In 2022, majority (65%) of the Program on Social and Political Change (PSPC)'s funding came from external sources, whereas 35% were from internal funds. Its two external funding sources were: (1) the 2021 General Appropriations Act (GAA) for Comprehensive Release (FCR), which supported its Policy Studies for Political and Administrative Reform project; and (2) the National Research Council of the Philippines (NRCP) for the commissioned project of publishing a Compendium of NRCP Research Works and Policy Advisory.

## STRATEGIC STUDIES PROGRAM (SSP)

Although majority (75%) of the Strategic Studies Program (SSP)'s funding came internally, SSP was also able to secure external funding (25%) from Konrad Adenauer Stiftung Philippines. SSP used this fund to finance speakers and moderators for the podcasts/webinars it conducted, as well as for the expenses that were incurred in producing publications based on these events, such as in hiring of transcribers and documenters.



# END-OF-TERM REPORT UNDER UP PRESIDENT DANILO L. CONCEPCION

## AUGUST 2017 TO DECEMBER 2022

The transition of the University of the Philippines from the administration of President Danilo L. Concepcion to that of his successor, President Angelo Jimenez, allows us to reflect briefly on the University of the Philippines Center for Integrative and Development Studies (UP CIDS) publications and activities from August 2017 to December 2022, as well as to thank President Concepcion for his constant support to UP CIDS.

Under his UP Administration (February 9, 2017 to February 8, 2023), President Concepcion has provided an enabling environment for research, not least of which was his success in raising UP's budget for research. This allowed UP CIDS to keep its Program budget for six years. Without President Concepcion's support, our work as the University's policy research unit would not be possible.

Our deepest gratitude also goes to Vice President for Academic Affairs Ma. Cynthia Rose B. Bautista, who

helped strengthen the research foundation of UP CIDS through the establishment of the UP CIDS Programs, which she began as CIDS Executive Director from 1992 to 2000. Under her helm, the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs (OVPA) provided valuable guidance in the Center's research and other activities, and helped resolve the Center's administrative concerns involving UP System offices. Similarly, I thank OVPA Assistant Vice President Delia Tomacruz for her assistance with regards to administrative matters.

Over the past five-and-a-half years, UP CIDS oversaw the myriad of activities and publications of 12 UP CIDS Programs and Local-Regional Studies Network (LRSN). Through policy briefs, discussion papers, monographs, proceedings, webinars, and conferences, among others, each Program identified policy gaps and promoted reforms in their respective Program areas.<sup>1</sup>
